Pictured above are No. CA Wing pilot Bob Brahm with passenger Chana L. on the last of a 2-leg mission that began in her hometown of San Diego, CA. The 1st leg was flown by So. CA Wing pilot Jim Coleman to Bakersfield, CA. The 2nd leg ended in Palo Alto, CA, where Chana visits her oncologist at Stanford Medical Center for treatment of an ovarian tumor and intestinal cancer that require frequent isotope injections and scans. Chana is a 47-year-old single parent of four who is on social security disability.

Pictured right is an AFW mission carrying two of our passengers. Laurie B. is receiving chemotherapy for rectal cancer, and passenger Michael D. is being treated for advanced prostate cancer. They are part of a 3-leg mission. The first 2 legs were flown by pilot Dennis Shogren, So. CA Wing, from Paso Robles, CA to Medford, OR, where Laurie boarded, and on to Portland, OR. Norman Rittenhouse, WA Wing, flew the final leg to Seattle, WA. Michael is on limited income and Laurie is struggling to meet living expenses with two children, a single income household, and accumulating medical expenses.



Seven-year-old Jaime O. on one of 100 flights from San Diego, CA to Santa Monica, CA, where he received a small bowel transplant at UCLA and subsequently was diagnosed with cancer. Jaime lost his courageous battle on April 19th, just five days after his baby sister, Sofia, was born. Jaimie's family is very grateful for AFW and said they could not have continued his treatment without the organization's help. AFW pilots all expressed the great joy they received from flying Jaime and his mom, Soledad.

As this is being written, we are actively recruiting a full-time Development Director for Angel Flight West and the Angel Flight West

Foundation. This individual will be the principal staff person responsible for implementing our fund development strategy.

This is a significant step for AFW and the Foundation. As a not-for-profit, AFW is fairly small with an annual cash budget of just over one million dollars. It is unique for a not-for-profit of our size to employ a full-time Development Director. Not only will the Development Director fundraise for AFW, but they will also be growing the Angel Flight West Foundation.

The mission of the Foundation is to support AFW in perpetuity. Our goal is to have enough assets in

the Foundation so that the organization can accomplish its mission through the interest earned from Foundation investments. The existence of the Foundation along with the organization, provides the Development Director with the opportunity to present options to philanthropic investors looking to support a growing, successful volunteer pilot organization.

You may be asking yourself, in this challenging economy, how can AFW afford to invest in a Development Director? Actually, it's been on the "to do" list for several years. What makes it possible now is the vision and generosity of a long time supporter, volunteer pilot, and Board member, Kevin Kauffman, and Continued on page 3...

For some, the cost of getting there would be prohibitive.

the Kevin and Elaine Kauffman Family Foundation. Kevin wanted to continue to support AFW, but in such a way as to help assure our long term sustainability.

The Kauffman Family Foundation has donated \$25,000 toward employing a Development Director. They also issued a challenge grant, a first for AFW. For every dollar donated as part of the challenge, the Kauffman Family Foundation will match it up to \$50,000.

We have raised \$25,000 in the first quarter of this year, and are now working on the second \$25,000 which must be raised by the end of June. The seed money to pay our Development Director is in place. And now you have an opportunity to make a contribution that immediately doubles and goes towards

sustaining the organization in the future. When you make your next gift to AFW, indicate that you want it to go toward the Challenge Grant.

This is an exciting growth step for AFW and the Foundation, and only one of several changes in store for 2012 that will provide our crucial service to more passengers in need.

and a member since 2000. She has served on many other boards in her community of Bigfork, MT, and has previously worked as Chief Financial Officer for small companies in the semi-conductor and medical equipment sector. This vast and varied experience gives Laura a vital perspective to the job of helping lead AFW through the next two years. She came to AFW when she and her late husband, pilot/member Jim Long, became newly retired owners of an airplane. They decided that they wanted to do something more with their plane, and so it was AFW's good fortune that they happened to "pick up an AFW brochure at a little FBO somewhere in eastern Montana"

while on a cross-country trip. They both immediately became involved flying missions and Jim joined the Board. As a non-pilot, Laura says when Jim joined AFW, "I sort of came along as a package deal." After Jim's passing in 2004, Laura says, "When AFW called and said they needed a treasurer, I was thrilled."

When asked how it feels to be the first female and non-pilot Chairman of AFW's Board of Directors, there is a short silence before Laura quips, "Since I've never been a man or a pilot I don't really know the difference." A seemingly witty response until you realize she genuinely doesn't give the gender issue much attention at all. "It never occurs to me that because I am a woman I can't do the same things a man can do. I just look at it that I'm the chairman. That's my job." And as far as not being a pilot she says.

Laura is sensitive to some of the formidable challenges facing AFW such as "a vulnerable economy, rising fuel costs for pilots and the struggle to keep pilots invigorated with the mission of the organization." For the present she says, "Our membership has risen, which is great. Cheri, Josh and the staff are terrific with a committed and professional approach to their jobs. Alan's depth of understanding of the organization makes him a great ED, and I am confident in his ability to keep us in the right direction."

For the future Laura says, "Better outreach is near and dear to me—to get the word out, especially in rural areas both for patients and pilots. I would love to see us work on rural and underserved areas being better represented. I would

love to see AFIDS 2.2 up and running. We are so blessed to have Stephan [AFW's webmaster]. He is an amazing angel that does so much and asks for nothing back. AFIDS is not just for us, but for other organizations around the country to serve our patients and pilots so everyone gets the care they need."

She is extremely proud that "we are very fortunate to keep going without any major cuts in our services or layoffs. That is due to the foresight of the Foundation, our safety net that sets us apart from other charitable organizations." As AFW faces those formidable challenges, Laura is nothing but optimistic, extending praise for such "a great organization!" And one that is in very good hands.

Letter from an AFW Passenger


Dear Josh,

health care sector working behind the scenes in advocacy and funding. Although she enjoyed the work, Erin says her position put her "one or two steps removed from direct service."

Now, at AFW, she "feels more connected to the outcome." Sometimes the sorrow of "losing passengers" and "having to say no" to mission requests is "really tough." But the flip side of being able to see "when it works out and the passenger is doing better" makes her "feel like I played a role in it." This connection for her goes further as pilots and passengers whom she communicates with mostly by phone come into the Santa Monica headquarters. She says, "It's nice to put a face to the names."

When asked how she feels about flying Erin says, "I used to like it as a kid, but now it's definitely something I have to get used to." The irony that she is now working with aviation doesn't escape her. She chuckles, "It's a little ridiculous." Maybe if she can get away from her desk once in a while, flying a mission or two might help. *Note:* Since this interview, Erin has "actually had a really lovely flying experience, which has been beautiful and exciting. I can see why the pilots love to fly so much!"
